Local Control and Accountability Plan and Annual Update Template

The Local Control and Accountability Plan (LCAP) and annual update template shall be used to provide details regarding local educational agencies' (LEAs) actions and expenditures to support pupil outcomes and overall performance pursuant to Education Code sections 52060, 52066, 47605, 47605.5, and 47606.5.

Expelled pupils (for county offices of education only): *coordination of instruction of expelled pupils pursuant to Education Code section 48926. (Priority 9)*

Foster youth (for county offices of education only): *coordination of services, including working with the county child welfare agency to share information, responding to the needs of the juvenile court system, and ensuring transfer of health and education records. (Priority 10)*

B. Pupil Outcomes:

Pupil achievement: *performance on standardized tests, score on Academic Performance Index, share of pupils that are college and career ready, share of English learners that become English proficient, English learner reclassification rate, share of pupils that pass Advanced Placement exams with 3 or higher, share of pupils determined prepared for college by the Early Assessment Program. (Priority 4)*

Other pupil outcomes: *pupil outcomes in the subject areas described in Education Code section 51210 and subdivisions (a) to (i), inclusive, of Education Code section 51220, as applicable. (Priority 8)*

C. Engagement:

Parent involvement: *efforts to seek parent input in decision making, promotion of parent participation in programs for unduplicated pupils and special need subgroups. (Priority 3)*

Pupil engagement: *school attendance rates, chronic absenteeism rates, middle school dropout rates, high school dropout rates, high school graduations rates. (Priority 5)*

School climate: pupil suspension rates, pupil expulsion rates, other local measures including surveys of pupils, parents and teachers on the sense of safety and school connectedness. (Priority 6)

The meeting first started with an explanation of the new Local Control Funding Formula and how it differs from how schools were funded in the past. Attendees learned how the formula is executed and how the schools are going to be help accountable for the funds through the LCAP and the eight state priorities. Next, the meeting shifted to presenting Sol’s LCAP. Each goal was presented by identifying what state priority it was addressing, which students the goal was aimed towards and how we were measuring progress. Funding for unduplicated counts has increased to an estimated \$150,017 for the 2014-15 LCAP year. Given that approximately 94% of our students qualify for the unduplicated count, we are applying the supplemental and concentration LCFF funding on a charterwide basis. Based on the fact that we desire to have all students exceed the national norm for growth on the MAP test, we will spend approximately \$227,000 to attract and retain talented ELA and Math teachers.

We determined that we needed to increase or improve our ELA and Math instructional services to the unduplicated student population by 7.47% given the increase in funds generated by such students. In order to accomplish this, we will increase and improve the services for these students by hiring and retaining talented ELA and Math teachers.
